As I thought about the type of person we needed, it was clear we needed someone with business experience in a large organization with a high degree of focus on customer service and quality and a deep knowledge of the County.


Mark built his career in financial services in large organizations like J.P. Morgan, Computershare and others. He was born and bred in Anne Arundel County and knows it like the back of his hand.

The humane treatment of animals is important to me and many county residents. I am sponsoring legislation to stop cruelty towards captive elephants by banning the use of bullhooks, which are used in training to cause pain or instill fear. Elephants are intelligent animals, and the public mood on captive elephants is shifting. More than 50 jurisdictions already regulate the use of bullhooks and after featuring elephant for 145 years, Ringling Bros. circus recently announced they are ending elephant acts altogether. This legislation will be discussed at the August 10th Council work session, along with other items.
