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From the County Executive



With the recent actions of the Maryland General Assembly and the Anne Arundel County School Board Nominating Commission, I wanted to take an opportunity to discuss why I and every county executive before me have taken a strong interest in the Anne Arundel County Board of Education.


There are two main reasons: the first is practical and the second is personal. As a practical matter, education is the most important thing that county government does. Reason number two is personal. I believe deeply in the life-changing potential of education. I am myself a trained educator and believe my own modest success in life has been

attributable to the great education I received.

Under the O'Malley Administration, the convoluted process for selecting members of the school board was manipulated by the governor and the General Assembly to pack the school board with members of the Democratic Party and to make it extremely difficult for members of the Republican Party to serve on the school board. That is why, for the entire duration of the modern selection system, there has usually been only one Republican on the nine-member board, and at times there has been none.

The citizens of the county were the losers in this game. While Republicans, Democrats and Independents all share the goal of advancing our school system from good to great, they have different views on how to get there. This episode has made it clear that it is time to jettison altogether the county's appointed school board, which is answerable only to politicians, and to replace it with an elected school board answerable to the people.

This month marks the culmination of the most important responsibility we hold as elected officials, that of passing a county budget. The Council will finalize the submitted budget proposed by the County Executive and seek to continue to support efforts that make our county great. Significant focus will be placed on capital budget efforts to ensure the most vulnerable school initiatives are addressed. The Council will hear from the Auditor on June 7th, followed by the Administration, and expects to finalize the budget on June 15th.
