Don't interrupt when another group member is making a point





Brooklyn Park Data

- The median income for the area is \$49,171, under half of the county average median income of \$103,255 (US Census American Community Survey, 2022).
- Poverty rate is 25.1 percent; five times the poverty rate of Anne Arundel County.
- Child poverty is 35 percent. (US Census American Community Survey, 2022).
- Brooklyn Park has at least six rising socio-economic indicators of need:
- ✔ Percent of families living at or below poverty
- ✔ Percent of the population without a high school diploma
- Percent of households receiving food stamps (SNAP)
- Emergency department visit rate
- ✓ Percent of low income households
- Percent of low income housing
- Percent of low birth weight infants
- Preventable hospitalization rate
- Disproportionately African American
- Preterm births







Brooklyn Park

Cradle to Career Education: Ensuring smooth transitions to and through Kindergarten, middle and high school to college or a career (from birth to career)

Child poverty at 35 percent, childcare desert, preterm births, Percent of the population without a high school diploma increasing, lack of summer programming, increasing chronic absence in schools, free and reduced lunch 80-90 percent

Healthy Families: Access to high quality health care; decrease infant mortality, increase life expectancy and improve behavioral health

Food desert, Low life expectancy, lack of primary care, high infant mortality, high preventable hospitalization rate, high emergency department visit rate, higher substance use rate, few outdoor spaces

Economically Secure Families: Higher employment, entrepreneurship, livable and family sustainable wages

Median income for the zip code is \$49,171, (less than half the county average). Few businesses paying a livable wage. Career center is in Linthicum and not accessible by public transportation

Safe and Thriving Communities: High quality affordable housing, a thriving commercial core, access to recreational spaces, nutritious food and transportation

Substandard overcrowded housing in parts, inequitable tree canopy, and poor air and water, FARMS rate ranges from 70-88 percent, abandoned retail spaces, no grocery store, area of the county with least access to cars. High rate of gun violence.
