Introduction

The eligible census tract for ENOUGH, 7502.01 is the Pumphrey neighborhood within Brooklyn Park (Zip Code 21225). The collaborative is extending the boundaries to the four square miles of Brooklyn Park, North Anne Arundel County. The area shares a boundary with Baltimore City. The geographic boundaries of Brooklyn Park are bordered on the west by Route 684 (Baltimore Annapolis Boulevard), to the south of I-895 and the Patapsco River, north of I-695, and ending on the east at the Baltimore City line that crosses Route 2. Route 2, also known as Ritchie Highway, runs north and south through Brooklyn Park. It is a very busy, four lane highway with no safe place to cross. It acts as a barrier for cooperation between the neighborhoods on the east and west sides of the road. The county line between Baltimore City and Brooklyn Park runs right through a residential street. Increased residential mobility related to economic issues means that families are constantly moving between Anne Arundel County and Baltimore City without any knowledge they have done so.

Brooklyn Park is composed of several smaller neighborhoods: Olde Brooklyn Park (west of Gov. Ritchie Highway – Maryland Route 2), Brooklyn Heights (east of Gov. Ritchie Highway), Arundel Village (along and north of Church Street), Roland Terrace (along and south of Church Street), Arundel Gardens (southwest of Gov. Ritchie Highway and south of Hammonds Lane), and Pumphrey, which lies along Belle Grove Road, south of the Patapsco River. The population was 34,128 in 2020 (U.S. Census, 2020).

Brooklyn Park continues to be an extremely diverse area. The African American population is still the highest demographic but the Hispanic community is growing faster than all other races and ethnicities (See Table 1 below).

Brooklyn Park (zip code 21225) has over four times the poverty rate of the rest of the county at 22.3 percent. The Pumphrey census tract of Brooklyn Park has a child poverty rate of 35 percent according to the most recent US census data (U.S. Census American Community Survey, 2023). The median income for the zipcode is \$50,069, under half of the county's average median income of \$116,548 (US Census, 2023). There are at least six rising socio-economic indicators of need including the percent of families living at or below poverty, percent of the population without a high school diploma, the percent of households receiving food stamps (SNAP), the emergency department visit rate, the percent of low birth weight infants, the preventable hospitalization rate and the percentage of minorities (Table 2). The entire area is classified as a food desert and a childcare desert (Anne Arundel County Department of Health, 2024). Life expectancy is fifteen years shorter for residents of Brooklyn Park than it is for those in Arnold, just 15 miles down the road (Figure 13).

Brooklyn Park is located in the watershed of the non-tidal portion of the Patapsco River. The sub watersheds that include Brooklyn Park have high levels of impervious surface, a low percentage of forest cover and low water quality that does not meet federal Clean Water Act standards. The primary water quality impacts are from excessive inputs of nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) and sediments (Anne Arundel County Department of Health, 2025). Brooklyn Park has a tree equity score of 72 out of 100, which is the lowest in the county, whereas Severna Park has a tree equity score of 96 (American Forests Tree Equity Score, 2021). Trees can play a significant role in the health of people, as tree covers provide shade and help cool neighborhoods. Lower temperatures also mean lower energy consumption and lower electricity bills.



Figure 1: Percent of Population with Income Below Poverty Level, Anne Arundel County, 2022




Pumphrey Census Tract


Figure 2: Median Household Income, Anne Arundel County, 2023



Food

Almost 25.7% or 3,326 households receive food stamps (SNAP) (U.S. Census American Community Survey, 2023). The entire area is classed as a food desert; defined as an area without ready access to fresh, healthy and affordable food. There is one grocery store (Save-A-Lot) in Brooklyn Park and many residents rely on convenience stores and fast food options.

Figure 4: Households Without Broadband* by Census Tract, Anne Arundel County, 2023





Figure 5: Households Without A Device* by Census Tract, Anne Arundel County, 2023




Number of Childcare Providers in Brooklyn Park

Transportation

While Brooklyn Park is one of the most densely populated areas in the county, it has very few resources and services. Previously, there was only one bus route in Brooklyn Park, the number 69 that ran hourly and was not connected to employment routes. There have been small improvements like the addition of route number 70 that runs from Baltimore to Annapolis, and the county has added the Brooklyn Park connector, a small route from Brooklyn Park to Ferndale, connecting to the Cromwell Light Rail station in Glen Burnie. While there are improvements to transportation, it is still a struggle for those living in the area as many families either have no care or a shared vehicle that is old and unreliable. In Brooklyn park, only 2 percent of residents work at home as opposed to the county average of 23 percent. That means more are spending dollars on childcare and transportation (Table 6 and 7).



Figure 7: Study Area Existing Conditions and Gap in Sidewalk Location






Healthy Families Pillar

When patterns of hospitalization are examined by ZIP code (Figure 8), they generally reflect the social determinants illustrated in Table 2. Zip code 21225, which contains Brooklyn Park, has the highest hospitalization rate of anywhere else in the county, most likely due to the lack of accessible primary health care and therefore lack of preventative care. Residents may wait until their health issue is more serious to seek care, especially those without access to health insurance. The only federally approved health center closed over six years ago. There are now two urgent care facilities. There are very few behavioral health facilities. Most human services, including eligibility for benefits, public housing and workforce development, are located in Glen Burnie; a distance of almost 8 miles. In 2025, Total Health Care opened a Federally Qualified Health Clinic in Brooklyn, less than two miles from Brooklyn Park, which will offer more health resources to Brooklyn Park residents, including primary care. However, we have to find a method to get Brooklyn Park residents there.

Health Professional Shortage Areas

Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) are designated by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) as having shortages of primary medical care, dental or mental health providers and may be geographic or facility-based. Brooklyn Park is both a Health Professional Shortage Area and a Medically Underserved Area (Figure 9).

Figure 9: Health Professional Shortage Area and Medically Underserved Areas and/or Populations, Anne Arundel County, 2024



Infants born preterm (<37 weeks of gestation) by ZIP code, Anne Arundel County, 2018-2022




Figure 11: Infants Born Preterm (<37 weeks of gestation) by ZIP Code

Above County Proportion of Births with Low Birth Weight (<2500 grams) by ZIP Code, Anne Arundel County, 2018-2022





Figure 12: Above County Proportion of Birth with Low Birth Weight (<2500 grams) by ZIP Code


Proportion of Live Births with Late or No Prenatal Care Initiation, Anne Arundel County, 2018-2022



Life Expectancy

According to the University of Florida Department of Physiology and Aging (2024) access to healthcare is one of the important indicators of life expectancy because it increases the likelihood of detecting and treating health conditions early. In contrast, those living in rural areas or without insurance are less likely to seek treatment, whether for preventative care or to address current health conditions. Other researchers have noted that factors such as poverty, food insecurity, and lack of access to education and employment opportunities can negatively impact health and life expectancy. According to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (2025) where we live may affect our chances of living a long, healthy life. Different neighborhoods have different access to stable housing, quality schools, good jobs, and affordable healthcare. Life expectancy changes by zip code and census tract in the county (Figure 13). Life expectancy can be up to 15 years longer for a resident living in Arnold as opposed to someone who lives in Brooklyn Park.

Brooklyn Park Schools

Belle Grove Elementary School serves the Pumphrey and Olde Brooklyn Park communities. As with the other Brooklyn Park schools, the student population is very diverse (Table 11 below). As well as being a community school, Belle Grove also has a Judy Center. Park Elementary serves the communities on the east side of Ritchie Highway (Brooklyn Heights and Arundel Village). Brooklyn Park Elementary serves students in the Arundel Gardens neighborhoods.

Homeless Youth

According to the National Network for Youth (2025), youth from low income neighborhoods, where there is a lack of safe spaces and social support, are more likely to become homeless. The numbers of homeless youth in each Anne Arundel County Public Schools cluster follow the same geographic pattern as other social determinants of health for the county and are unevenly distributed. The numbers are higher in school feeders that cover zip codes that are disproportionately African American and low income (Table 34). The North County Feeder System, which includes the Brooklyn Park zip code, has the most homeless youth at 219, an almost 21 percent increase since 2022 (Table 34 and Figure 14).

Figure 14: County Homeless Public School Students by School Cluster





Figure 15: Percent of Population with Less than High School Education, 25 Years or Older





Figure 16: Gun violence incidents by city of occurrence

Qualitative Section - What They Said

Introduction

Using economic mobility and child poverty outcomes we used open ended questions to gauge the opinions of residents of every age and race/ethnicity from a fourth grade class at Park Elementary to senior residents in the historically Black community of Patasco Park/Pumphrey. Data collection began with our kick off meeting on January 23, 2025 and has continued over the last six months. Leadership team members used their own connections to hold neighborhood meetings and to talk with their neighbors. Our not-for-profit groups talked to youth and residents they were connected to through their programming. We held focus groups with youth in afterschool programs. We gathered information at community events, food pantries and at community school meetings. We completed RBA turn-the-curves with the Leadership Team. Overall, using open-ended questions, we have gathered the opinions of over 850 residents related to improvements to the built environment, how to reduce poverty, and how to move residents to economic prosperity. The data came in through the following methods: handwritten on paper, in video format, in excel spreadsheets, typed in Word and on turn-the-curve format. All data was read and reread using qualitative research techniques to search out families of data then themes.

Overall, Brooklyn Park residents, young and old, like living in Brooklyn Park. It is quiet and peaceful, they know their neighbors, there's a sense of community, and some stores are walkable. Some had a sense that the neighborhood was part of Anne Arundel County, others described the area as a "suburb of Baltimore" or "South Baltimore." Here is a file link to raw data collected.

Brooklyn Park – Themes emerging from what they said.

Youth:

- Give kids opportunities for sports: Soccer, football, basketball court, volleyball, swimming - basically any sport
- Things for kids to do: Playground especially with swings, indoor outdoor park, more community activities, field trips, roller skating, swimming pool (note lack of air conditioning mentioned several times)
- Afterschool & weekends: Tutoring, how to make money and be successful, student social hour, groups for young men, financial literacy
- Services: Transportation, Walmart, Air-conditioners, chrome books
- Safety: Police cameras
- Barriers to success: Driving schools cost, can't get to driving school.
- Career: No career readiness center, need help for those who don't see college in their future, access to apprenticeships. Need training help for cosmetology, hair, nails, streaming and social media
- Traffic Safety: Roads are very dangerous. Hard for youth to play outside.
- **Food:** Community Kitchen at the Community Center to bring families/community together, turn old metro buses into mobile grocery stores

Adults:

- Connecting adults to livable wage jobs
- Affordable, accessible childcare
- Focus on jobs with a living wage for young adults new to the workforce: training for youth: business workshops, tutoring, work study programs, financial management programs, coaching, apprenticeships
- **Soft skills:** Soft Skills, Money Skills, and Computer skills is mission critical for our neighbors (Youth Job Seekers)
- **0-5 population:** Free childcare, Pre-K, Headstart, Early Head Start
- Things for youth to do: After school, field trips, summer programs
- Youth Life Coach: Case managing geared toward youth to fill in gaps that is missing in a single parent home or home with substance abuse, mentoring relationships who are bilingual and paid
- Safety: Speed bumps, traffic calming, police on bikes, Belle Grove Road
- **Built Environment:** Upgrades to Lloyd Keaser Center
- **Health:** Rats, access to health care
- **Resources:** MH/SA, Help for homeless, elderly
- Transportation
- Affordable, quality Housing
- Youth and adult men groups
