OEM SUMMER CAMP INSPIRES FUTURE PUBLIC SAFETY LEADERS

Nearly 30 young women from local high schools and colleges across Maryland spent a week in July immersed in emergency management, cybersecurity, and public safety at the third annual HERoes on the HERizon summer camp, hosted by the Anne Arundel County OEM.

The free, week-long camp, held July 14–18 at the OEM office in Glen Burnie, aimed to introduce participants to careers in public safety through hands-on experiences and mentorship from professionals across multiple agencies.

"This program is about more than education," it's about empowerment," stated Preeti Emrick, Director of Anne Arundel County OEM. "We want these young "THIS PROGRAM IS ABOUT MORE women to see themselves as THAN EDUCATION, IT'S ABOUT leaders in the future of emergency management. Our goal is to equip them with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to not only respond to emergencies but also to proactively build resilient communities. By fostering their interest and talent in this critical field, we are investing in a safer, more secure future for Anne Arundel County and beyond."

Throughout the week, participants engaged in CPR and trauma care training, observed members of Civil Air Patrol Maryland Wing's Emergency Services team lead a demonstration on ground and drone-based Search and Rescue tactics, and participated in a tour of the mini-city training facility, where public safety officials practice in realistic environments to best prepare for real-world emergencies.



After touring the mini-city, campers got to see the Prince George's County SWAT vehicle and be introduced to some of their K-9 officers.

Agency regional advisors led an engaging Jeopardy game that both informed and roused playful competition.

Among the numerous field trips included a visit to the Laurel Racetrack hosted by The Maryland Jockey Club, where campers learned about emergency planning and security efforts, with a hands-on tour of the track.

"This program is a cornerstone of our commitment to nurturing the next generation of leaders," stated Emrick. "Fostering an environment that enhances academic aspirations and provides avenues for career exploration."

Urban & Suburban Flooding:

A GROWING THREAT IN ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY

As climate patterns shift and severe weather becomes more frequent, communities across the country including right here in Anne Arundel County are facing a rising threat that's both fast-moving and often underestimated: urban and suburban flooding.

While images of major rivers and lakes overcoming their banks and shores often dominate national headlines, flooding in densely developed areas is increasingly common, and dangerous.


During heavy rain or a hurricane, our roads, parking lots, and storm drains can quickly become overwhelmed, turning everyday streets into fast-moving waterways. We can improve our communities' ability to handle these events by balancing the pace of development with a strategic investment in natural green spaces.

HURRICANE SEASON HEIGHTENS THE RISK

Anne Arundel County can be significantly impacted during Atlantic hurricane season, which runs from June through November. Tropical storms and hurricanes bring intense rainfall in short periods of time, making flash flooding a major hazard even for areas far from the coastline.



Flash floods can occur within minutes or hours of excessive rainfall. They're particularly dangerous because of their speed and unpredictability. In suburban and urban areas, where stormwater systems can be quickly overwhelmed, flash floods can trap people in vehicles, flood homes and basements, and destroy infrastructure.





A CHALLENGING FUTURE FOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

As these environmental threats intensify, local OEM faces another major challenge: a shrinking pool of federal funding and uncertainty surrounding the future of FEMA.

For years, local preparedness efforts have relied on federal grants through FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security. These funds have supported everything from mitigation projects and emergency response equipment to staff training and community outreach. But recent cuts and delays in grant cycles, along with broader discussions about the restructuring or reduction of FEMA's role, are placing increased uncertainty on counties and municipalities.



In this ever-changing world, building resilient infrastructure, establishing long-term planning capacity, and creating critical programs to protect our neighbors are essential investments.

OEM now has a broader role; we are not only on the front lines responding but also working to secure the resources and support that empower our communities to weather any challenge, both immediate and future.







BE INFORMED. BE PREPARED. BE SAFE.

Preparedness is the best defense against flooding. Whether you live in a flood-prone zone or not, it's important to take proactive steps to protect your home, your family, and your community.

Here's how to be flood-ready:



Sign Up for Alerts

Enroll in Alert Anne Arundel. Text **AAAlert** to #38276 to receive real-time emergency notifications, including flash flood warnings, evacuation orders, and shelter locations.



Know Your Risk

Visit <u>www.floodsmart.gov</u> or <u>https://msc.fema.gov/portal/search</u> to check if your home is in or near a flood zone.



Create an Emergency Plan

Know your evacuation routes, keep important documents in a waterproof container, and prepare a go-bag with essentials (medications, batteries, food, water, flashlights, etc.).



Safeguard Your Property

Consider installing sump pumps, clearing gutters and drains, and elevating utilities if you live in a flood-prone area. Flood insurance is also strongly recommended, it's not typically included in standard homeowners' insurance.



Never Drive Through Floodwaters

Just six inches of moving water can knock a person down, and one foot of water can carry away a vehicle. "Turn Around, Don't Drown" is more than a slogan — it can save your life.

YOUR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT TEAM IS HERE TO HELP

The Anne Arundel County OEM team works year-round to plan for, respond to, and recover from disasters, including flooding and severe weather events. PROTECTING OUR HOUSES OF WORSHIP

Anne Arundel OEM concluded the fifth year of the Protecting Our Houses of Worship Seminar series in May with a Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) in-person training and a tabletop exercise.

The four-month seminar series is open to all faiths and offers an in-depth look at emergency preparedness and both physical and cyber security. The seminar is supported by OEM, the County Police, US Department of Justice, US Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the non-profit Faith Based Information Sharing and Analysis Organization, and the Bay Area Community Church in Annapolis.

As nationally recognized by the DHS Center for Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships, the seminar series has effectively increased our county's faith-based organizations' awareness of available resources, hazard mitigation, resilience, and opportunities to collaborate.


We encourage our County's houses of worship to be prepared for all types of emergencies and disasters to not only protect their facilities, but to help protect their congregations as well. Houses of worship can start by following the four steps of emergency preparedness including Be Informed, Make a Plan, Build a Kit, and Getting Involved.

- **Be Informed:** Be aware of the potential hazards, both natural and manmade, that may occur in your community. Learn what protective measures to take before, during, and after an emergency.
- Make a Plan: We encourage houses of worship to assess the needs of their facilities and congregation to create a tailored plan for emergencies.
- Build a Kit: Building an emergency kit ensures you
 have the necessary items on hand before disaster
 strikes to be self-sufficient for at least 3 days.
- Getting Involved: Receive a first aid class by OEM, or join Anne Arundel County and City of Annapolis Community Emergency Response Team and get trained on basic disaster response skills. https://www.aaacert.org/ for more information.
- Additional Resources: Sign up to receive free emergency alerts via text. Text AAAlert to #38276 to receive text alerts.

WHOLE COMMUNITY INTEGRATION IN ACTION

The Whole Community approach to OEM engages business, government and nonprofit sectors to integrate the needs, capabilities and resources of the community.

As an example of this concept in action, Anne Arundel OEM enthusiastically supports the County Gun Violence Intervention Team (GVIT), an interagency initiative led by the Department of Health as a public health issue. OEM Outreach Unit members Jim Krempel and Jorge Paucar support GVIT outreach and policy initiatives across the county, including providing free gun locks at community events to raise awareness of firearm safety.



As part of the broader whole community preparedness effort, OEM offers free CRASE Training to community associations, businesses, houses of worship, and even standalone medical clinics. Jorge has also created the state's first Spanish-language version of CRASE Training. In the spring of 2025, Jim and Jorge provided CRASE instruction at the Maryland OEM Association Symposium.

Extending these efforts, OEM is also a member of the statewide Maryland Active Assailant Interdisciplinary Working Group, where Krempel served as a panelist discussing whole community integration at their 2025 Summit.
