Provides county and state leaders with a snapshot of relevant issues, goals, and priorities

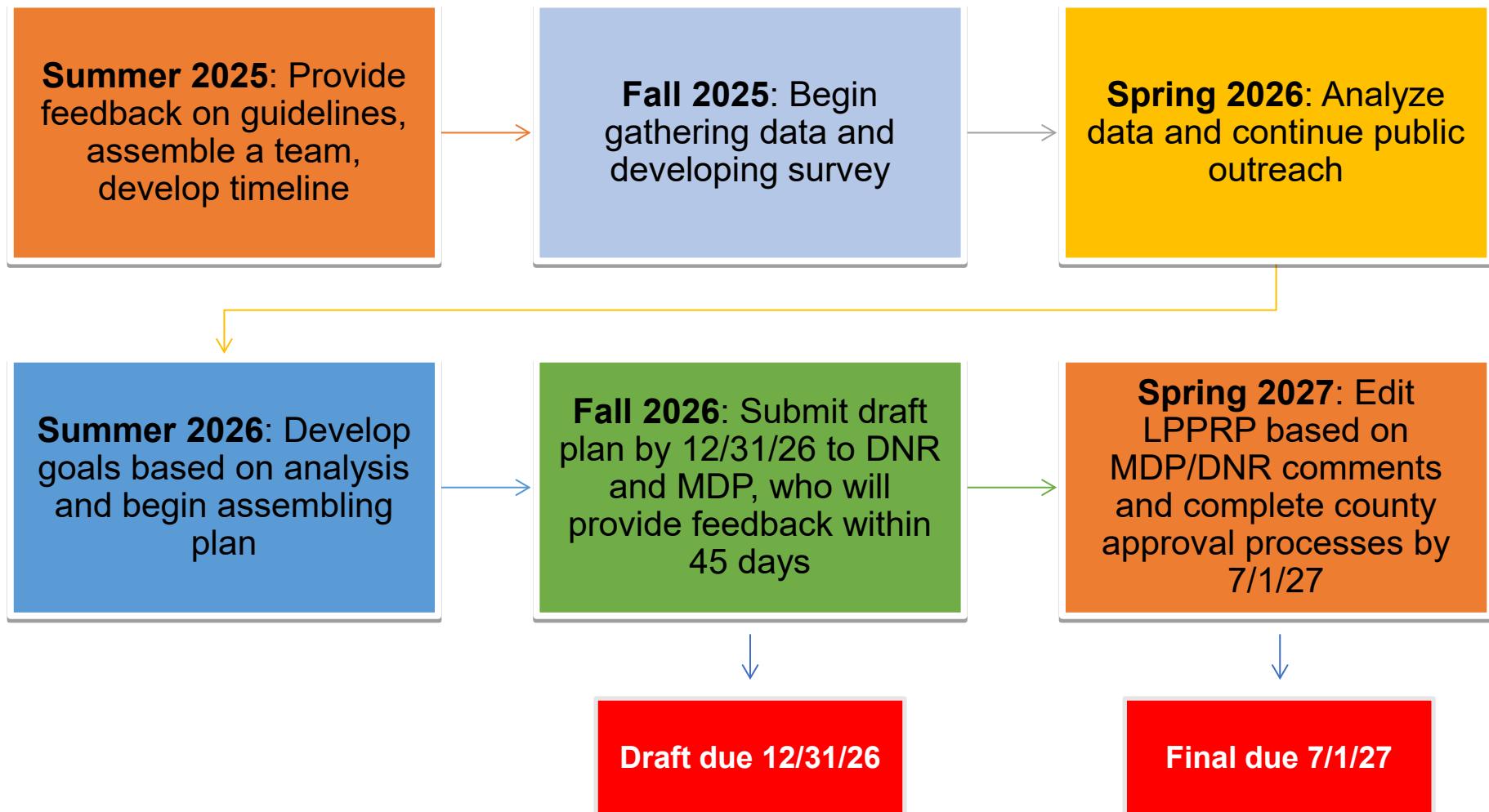
Provides opportunity for civil engagement and public feedback

Collaborative process between DNR, MDP, counties, and municipalities

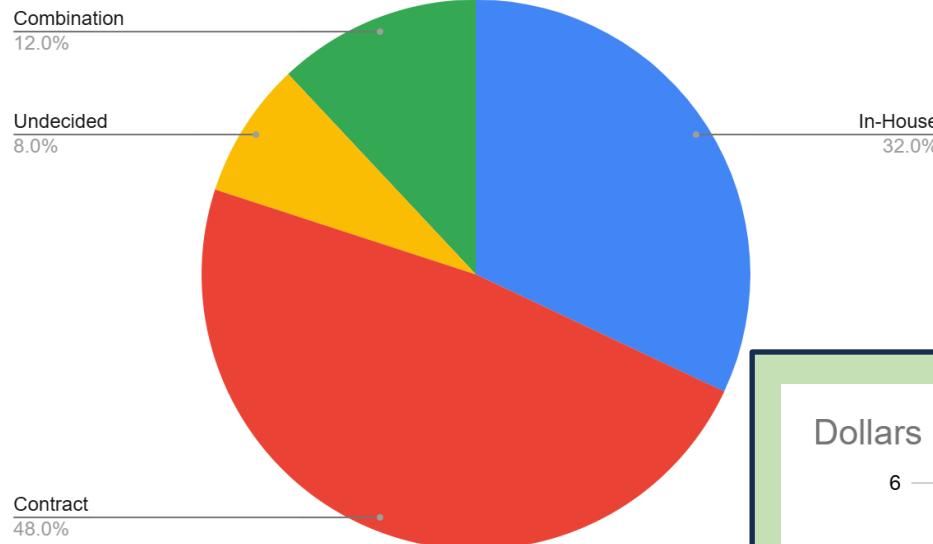
Prerequisite for county participation in Maryland's Program Open Space (POS) Local

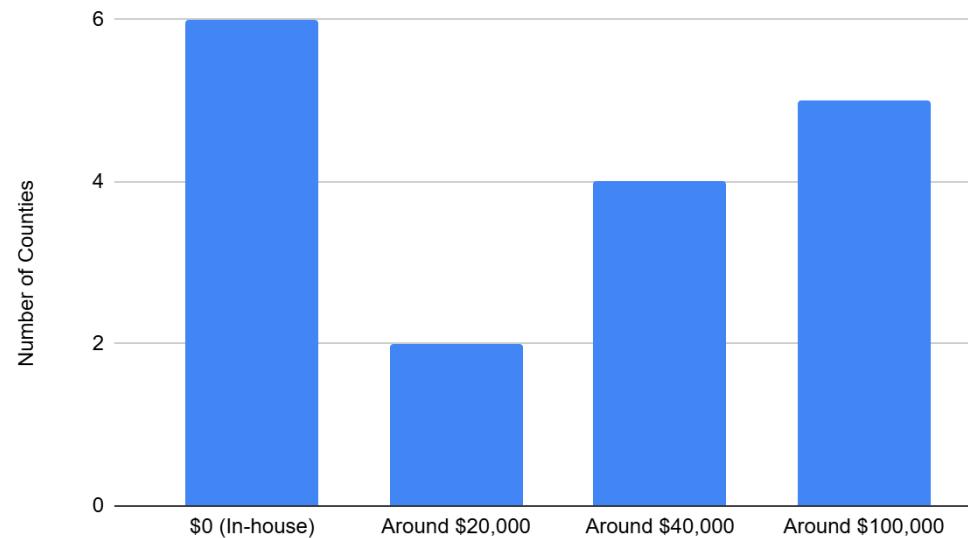

# Changes from 2022 Requirements



## Proximity Analysis

Separate proximity analysis required for the entire parks and recreation system, for water access, and for trails. All others are optional.

## Equity Analysis

Providing multiple options for how to assess park equity in your county.

## GIS Data Submission

Separate submission for datasets outside of the LPPRP itself. No tabular data required within the LPPRP.

## Agriculture Requirement Clarity

Greater clarity on which portions of this section must be completed by counties with other agricultural plans.

## Executive Summary

Include narrative, images, and maps to provide an overview of public parks and recreation

Highlight accomplishments, challenges, and goals

Explain environmental, economic, and health benefits of enhancing parks

# Parks and Recreation



## Overview of Parks and Recreation Facilities

Provide maps and summary narrative to describe park system and recreational amenities

Include the following types of land/facilities:

**Public Properties**  
Municipal, county, state,  
and federal land

**Quasi-public and  
privately owned land**  
open for regular public  
use (ex. Land owned  
by a land trust)

# Measuring User Demand



## Public Meetings

Offer opportunities for civic engagement



## Survey

Collect input from a wide variety of residents and analyze results



## Data Collection

Provide information on usage, demand, and participation rates from registration, sales, permits, and more. Provide an educated estimate of level of use from non-documented activity.



## Trends and Interpretation from Other Sources

Use information from government, academic, and other groups to supplement locally sourced data

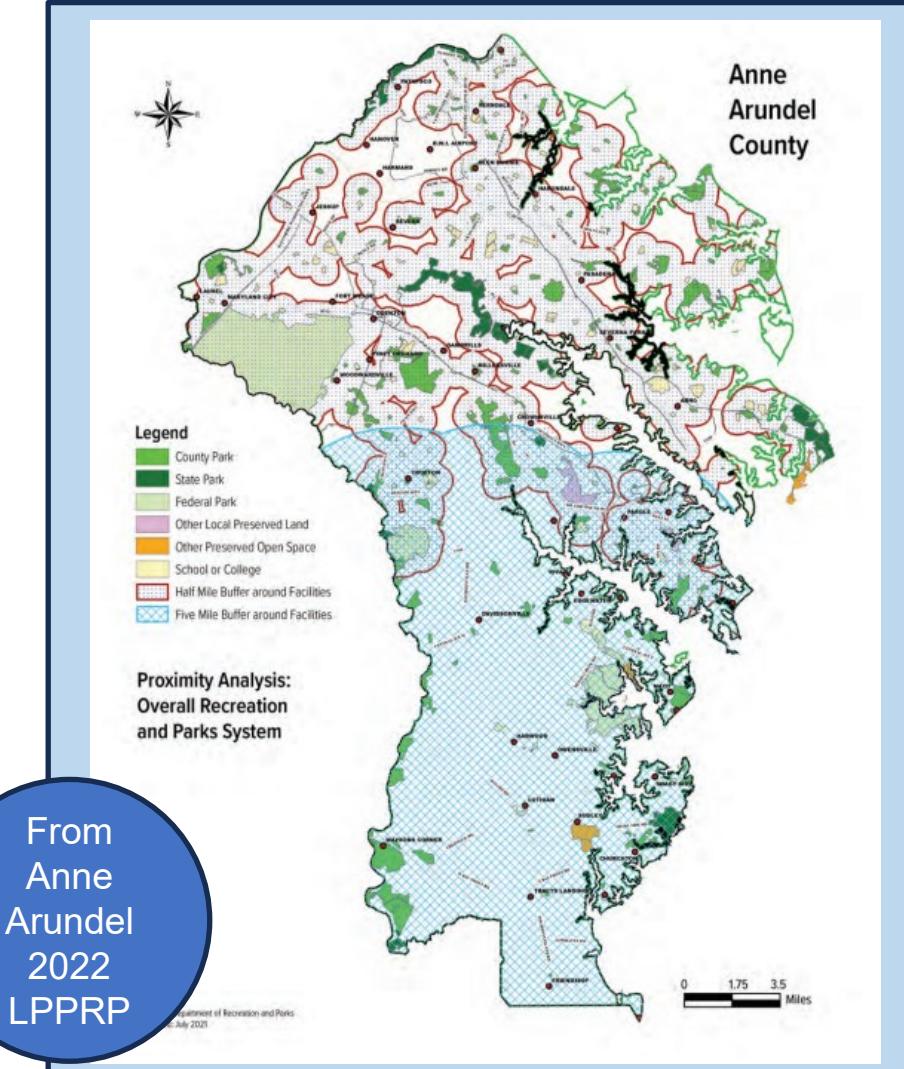
# Proximity Analysis

Determine where the public can and cannot readily access amenities

Include separate analysis for entire parks and recreation facilities, water access, and trails

Define catchment areas based on size and population density

Include maps and narrative

# Equity Analysis



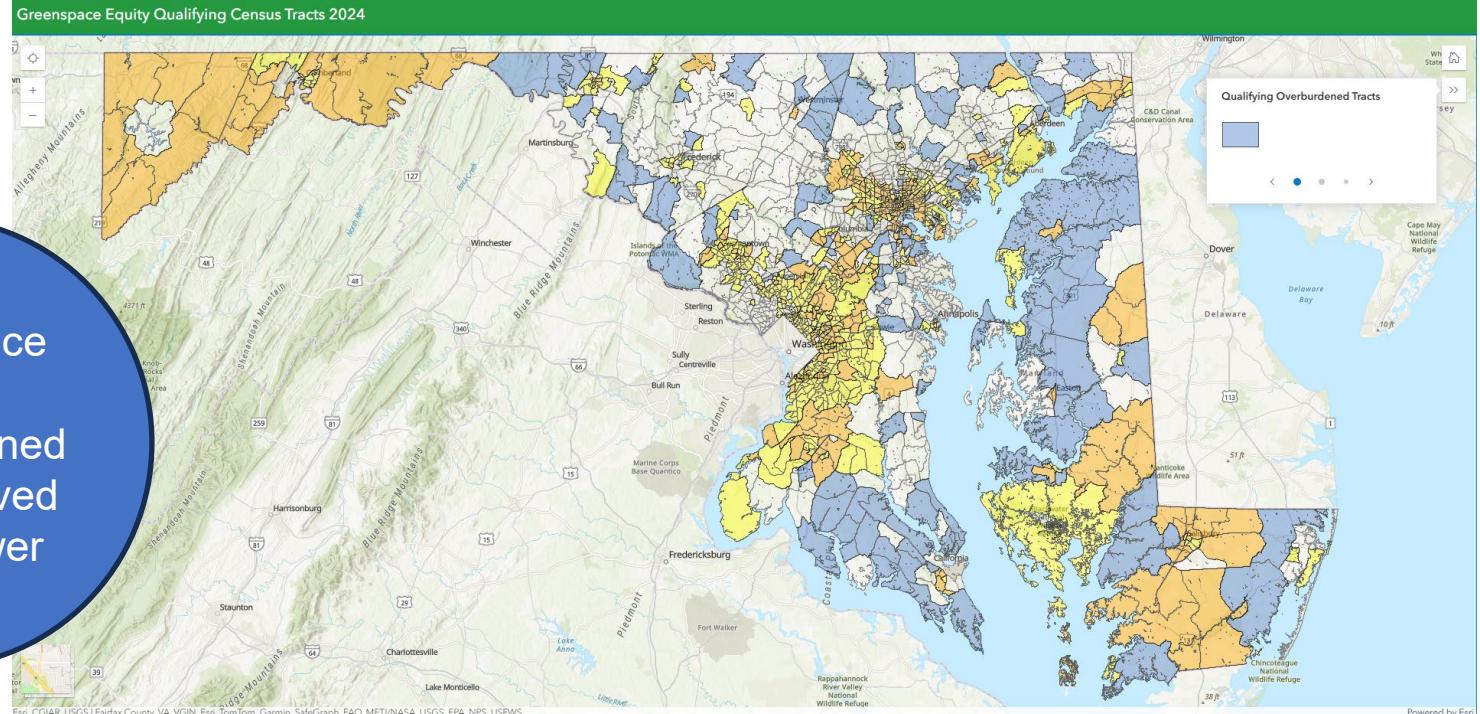
Counties can choose how to assess equity in their plans.

Greenspace Equity (below) or CDC Social Vulnerability Index are recommended options.

Assess overburdened and underserved areas by overlaying demographic data with park data

Provide maps and a brief narrative to discuss deficiencies in access

### County Goals

Create 2027 county goals for public parks and rec facilities based on Measuring User Demand, Proximity and Equity analysis sections

### State Goals

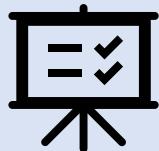
Include state goals for parks and rec and relate county goals to state goals

# Section 2 Parks and Recreation Implementing Programs



## Implementing Programs

- List funding programs and funding sources used to achieve goals
- Describe how these programs are used to benefit the public



Guidelines include boilerplate descriptions of: Program Open Space, Greenspace Equity Program, Land and Water Conservation Fund, Sustainable Communities designation, etc.

# Capital Improvement Plan



**Provide a 5-year Capital Improvement Plan**

Present potential land acquisitions, development projects, and rehabilitation priorities

It's recommended to include mid- and long-term planning horizons

Include municipal projects, if applicable

## Executive Summary



Provide a general overview of preserved areas

Highlight successes and challenges

Work collaboratively across departments on this section

Supplement summary with images, maps, and other data

Coastal counties: note the importance of protecting wetland migration corridors (and similar)



# Acreage and Mapping



Create and use maps to show progress in meeting local natural resource land preservation goals.

Convey information about the topics on the right, and how these inform and intersect with the 2027 LPPRP local natural resource conservation goals.

- Local and State Targeted Growth and Conservation Areas
- Targeted Ecological Areas (TEAS) using GreenPrint viewer
- Climate Change Adaptation priority areas (coastal areas must include this data)
- Public parks and recreation properties
- Parcels protected for natural resource conservation through long-term conservation easements, licenses, agreements, etc. or through fee-simple acquisition
- Land preserved by deed covenants (ex. homeowners association designated open space)

- Explain environmental and social benefits to protecting natural resource land
- List and explain county goals, provide update about progress of 2022 goals
- Relate county goals to state goals



## Implementing Programs

- Outline ordinances and programs that help achieve these goals
- Include basic information about these programs

## Section 4 Agricultural Land Preservation Substantially Equivalent Plan Status

- Explain public benefits of maintaining ag land

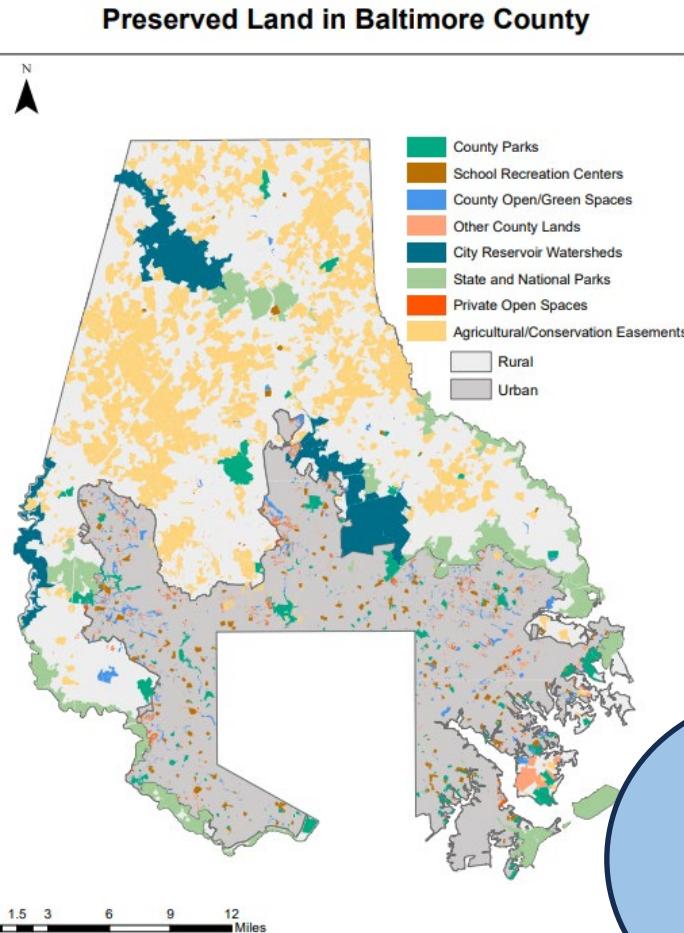

# Section 4 Agricultural Land Preservation Additional Guidelines



Only required for counties without a substantially equivalent plan:

Indicate if the county established Priority Preservation Areas in its comprehensive plan

Explain how the county's goals are implemented through its zoning and other land use tools

Explain how the county is monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of these programs

Present conclusions of the most recent evaluation of these programs or ordinances

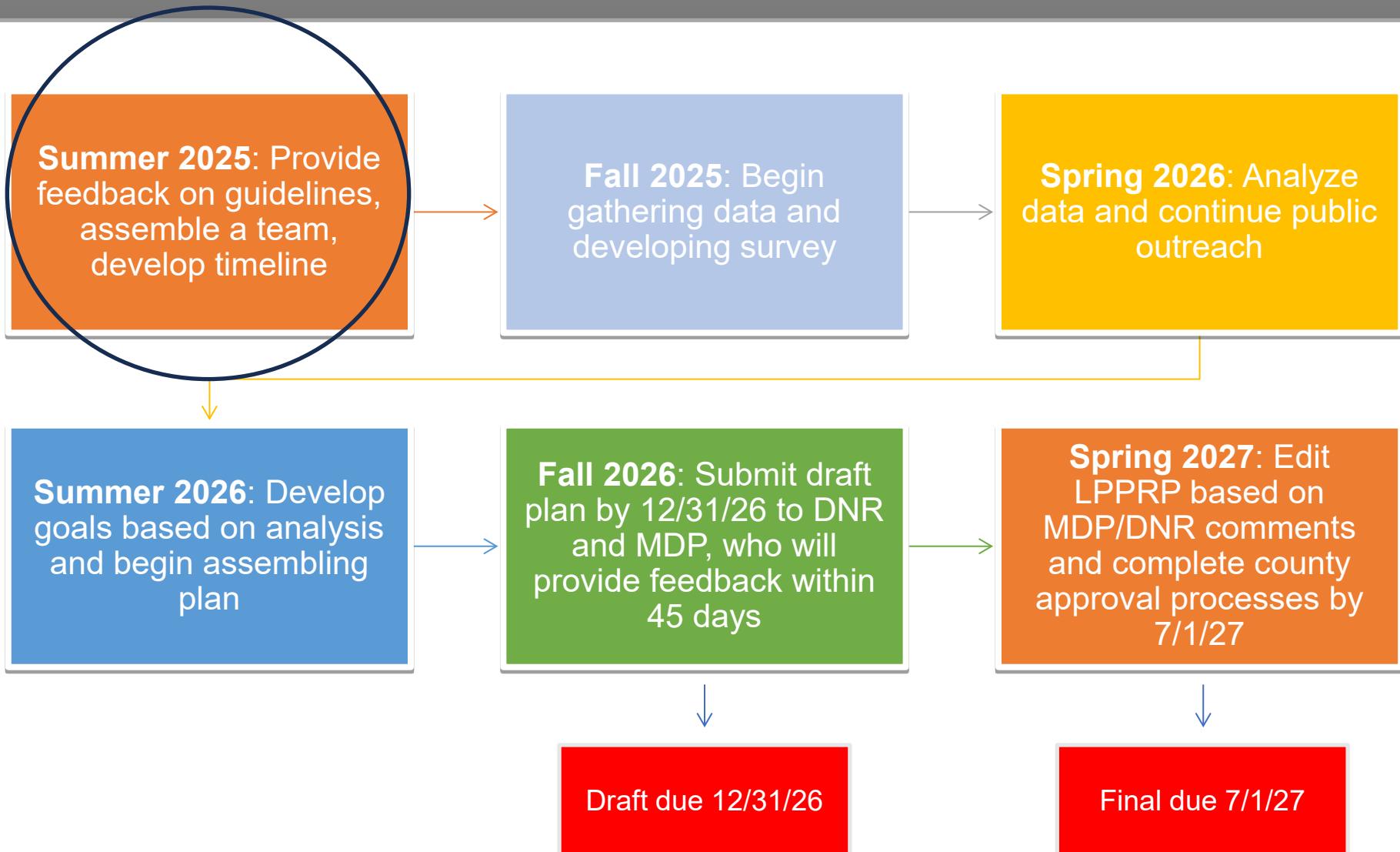

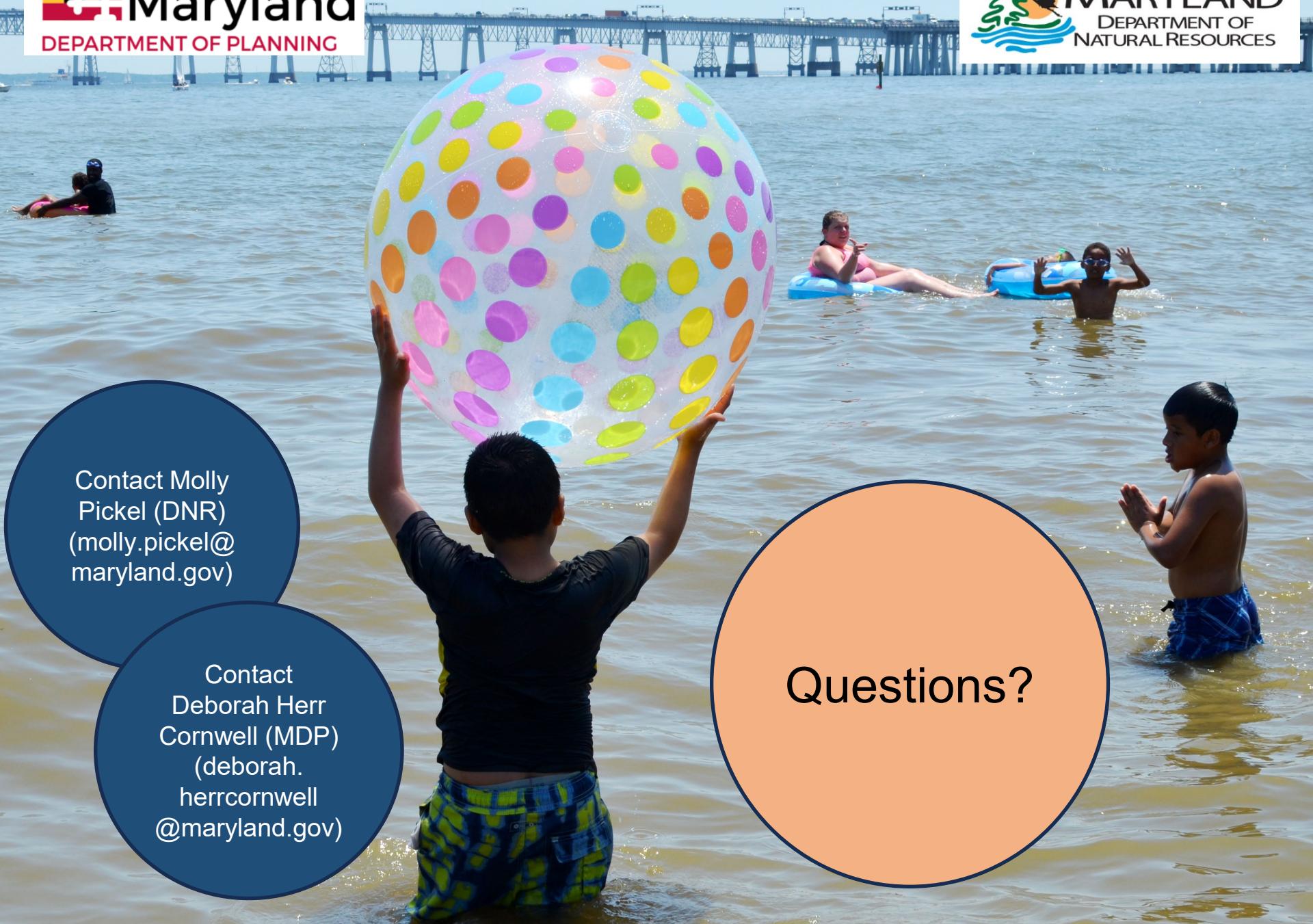
