That would exceed the allowable number of dwelling units in an R1, R2 or R5 zoned location. Thus this propose legislation is in violation of existing zoning codes. To correct this issue the proposed legislation needs to be modified to limit this to at least an R5 to R10 zoned area and the existing code would determine the allowable number of dwelling units per acre [R1= 1; R2 = 2; R5 = 5, R10 = 10]. There is also no stipulation on the adequacy of sewage disposal as a single acre would not support this density of 10 dwelling units on a stand alone septi system not tied into the county sewage system and would be a disaster. As such this bill as written cannot be supported as written. Perhaps an entirely new zoning district needs to be defined to accommodate cottage homes i.e. CH5, CH10. Since nearly half of all households own dogs, dog training is essential to keeping dogs, owners, and neighborhoods happy and safe. Dogs that don't bark excessively, or escape their yards and run at large, or lunge and jump at people and dogs they pass make for great neighbors. Dogs that respond promptly to verbal cues, and greet visitors politely, and settle quietly in the home make great companions. Owners often need professional assistance to achieve these goals. I own and operate Leash Free Living, a dog training company in Anne Arundel County. We have been serving Anne Arundel County for 13 years, and train 75 dogs daily. Our company vision is to enhance the quality of life for dogs by shifting dog culture towards more engaged, responsible and effective dog ownership. Towards that goal, we primarily help owners live more easily, safely and enjoyably with their pets. We also excel at training in other venues, including acting projects and competition obedience. My own Leash Free Living trained dog recently debuted in a Netflix mini-series, The Beast In Me (Lemon, playing Steve). We have trained over a dozen champions in competition Rally and Obedience, and just this week had lots of success at the National Championship dog show in Orlando. My own dog and two students competed in the RACH Invitational, open to only the highest ranking champions of each breed. Our dogs were #1 Herding, #4 Terrier, and #4 Toy. They were all the top scoring of their breed, and one made the Top 20. We had two dogs compete in the Obedience Classic Tournament, placing 2nd overall in the class and 11th overall in the class. We are proud to be training dogs well locally, and on a nationally recognized level. Our client data tells us that 80% of our clients live within 5 miles of our training facility. Easier access to dog training services through proximity would be a huge benefit to our communities. Dog training largely happens one on one, or in small groups. The lower traffic

My name is Sincere Coles. I am a member of the Capitol Accountability Project, and I am here to speak in opposition to Resolution 36-25 in its current form. This County is being asked to establish and resource a Multicultural Office while Black Americans—specifically Freedmen and their descendants who are residents of Anne Arundel County—still do not have a comparable office with clear authority, dedicated funding, or accountability. That imbalance matters. Equity cannot exist when one community is structurally excluded from the same institutional access others receive. We are not asking for special treatment. We are asking for equal treatment. Before additional assistance or infrastructure is extended elsewhere, this County must address the long-standing absence of a formal, empowered office for Black American Freedmen. The disparity in recognition and resource allocation is not theoretical. It is measurable, persistent, and the result of policy decisions. Moving forward without correcting it reinforces a pattern where Black Americans are asked, once again, to wait. For these reasons, we respectfully but firmly call on this Council to pause Resolution 36-25 and reopen the process to allow for community-submitted amendments, so equity, specificity, and accountability can be ensured before this body proceeds.

A greater proportion of dog owners are making use of dog training services. With overall pet ownership on the rise, the demand for dog training services has never been greater. Not only do we need more of these service establishments, but they need to be in locations that are convenient to our everyday lives.

Having the ability to access these facilities in the commercial and industrial zones and also in the RA and RLD districts (when they are associated with a Kennel), makes sense. Dog training coincides with typical business hours and does not involve overnight stays. The dogs are in a controlled, supervised environment with a very low trainer to dog ration (usually 1:1). These uses are highly compatible with the zoning districts identified in the legislation (Bill 93-25).

Please adopt this Bill. It is the appropriate remedy to address this growing challenge. Thank you for your support of this legislation.
